A Message To All Georgetown Dental School Alumni

For 15 of the last 23 years, the sons of Georgetown have proudly stamped their hallmark across the program books of the Annual Clinic Meeting of the District of Columbia Dental Society. This March meeting, which has come to be known as the 3rd largest regional meeting of an American Dental Association component, has been and is sometimes still called the Five-State Meeting, but is more officially known as the Postgraduate Dental Clinic.

These prominent graduates of the University Dental School, in the top office of General Chairman, have been 15 of the 23 reasons for the string of outstanding successes enjoyed over the years:

And ranking very closely with these leaders have been untold numbers of exceptionally talented and hard working committee sub-chairmen whose efforts have converted ideas to action. Here again, Georgetown men have set deeply their roots, spending their sapling years serving apprenticeships in many varied capacities. Similarly, the listing of clinicians, whether in the detailed three-hour Registered Clinics or the shorter Table Clinics, always carries a heavy representation of Georgetown graduates or faculty and students.

In this vein, last year's feature success, *New Horizons in Dentistry*, showing a full scale research in action tableau boasted a very fine addition in the Georgetown contribution, conducted and manned almost entirely by students. We point with pride to this research display which will take form for its third year, now that it is being taken up by one of Dentistry's largest meetings in a neighboring city.

A practical and highly successful formula for this meeting has been built and expanded, revised and improved over the years, but even though a General Chairman or

Vice Chairman of a Section will harvest these fruits of experience, there must be provided a new and worthwhile interest if a continually increasing registration is to be enjoyed. This year's Chairman, E. Milburn Colvin, Jr., has emphatically established a policy of providing a really fine meeting. This means that money will be spent where it is needed to do so. And so, the trend for this year emerges as a plan to provide more men with the close personal contact which results in a greater transfer of knowledge—a more highly intensive clinical program presented in a more easily absorbed structure. This is to be achieved by: 1) having made very careful selections of Registered Clinicians and their topics; 2) sifting through the Table Clinics carefully so that they are fewer, but of top calibre, eliminating the three-ring-circus effect; 3) adopting a projected table clinic program which will be presented twice, in which a topic is covered in detail in an allotted 18-20 minutes on a large screen with the audience comfortably seated; 4) the visual education program is hand-picked for interest and practical value, being repeated at the same time each day, thereby making it highly convenient to view, whereas it might otherwise be passed over; 5) the most highly attractive and practical scientific exhibits are being brought in; and 6) three fine panels are to be heard in two-hour discussions of the immediately foreseeable most absorbing problems in both treatment and office policy.

This begins to add up to a meeting that should not be missed, but in addition other more social demands are to be made on the registrant's time. To begin with, the Sunday afternoon get-together, the President's Reception, will be more attractive than ever, while the children will simultaneously be spellbound by the very special events at their Children's Party. Careful timing will be evident in the programming of the traditional Opening Luncheon; the noted speaker will contain his remarks to the prescribed timing, and introductions will be minimal. Unusual entertainment and excellent food will create a real rivalry in the Stag Night program to last year's success. The Dinner Dance will exhibit all the fine features which have set it aside as special year after year. The Georgetown Alumni will rally at breakfast and find that a very interesting event has been designed especially for us. With the return to Garfinckel Fashions, the Style Show Luncheon will be an outstanding item for men and women alike. The Dental Hygienist and the Dental Assistants will attract attention with affairs of their own; and their outstanding representatives will be found on the clinic programs as well. The *International College of Dentists* will be host at Sunday morning breakfast this year.

The years pass into one another, and with each passing Postgraduate Dental Clinic new credits are scored for the men of Georgetown in their clinical progress in modern dentistry and in their exceptionally fine part of the administration of the meeting.

PROJECTED CLINICS

A new and unusual presentation at the District of Columbia Post-Graduate clinic on March 13, 1955, will be that of "Projected Clinics." These have been featured at the American Dental Association meeting, and at the Greater New York Dental meeting with a great deal of success. They are the outgrowth of the desire to see table clinics in comfort to the viewer, and without strain to the clinician. Slides in color will be projected on the screen, showing clinical material, such as models and armentaria.

The presentation will be continuous, and problems commonly encountered in routine practice will be offered by nine clinicians. They will speak for 18 minutes each. These clinics will run progressively on Monday, March 14th from 9 A.M. to 12 noon, and will be repeated on Wednesday, March 16th from 2 P.M. to 5 P.M. Each clinician will speak only once each session.

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
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
